Each copy was made by hand, and we had a daily paper! It’s hard enough to do this with computers and printers. Wow!! Think what a feat the old way was.

One camper, Tim Hurdt, who was on the newspaper staff later became an editor of a large California newspaper. He always credited the beginning of his work to the camp newspaper.
